





MAJOR CONCERNS 2013-2014

Major Concern 1: To develop effective teaching and learning strategies for academic pursuit

1.1 To enhance effective pedagogies

Actions Taken

- All subject departments enhanced questioning skills in lessons across all levels.
- Most subject departments designed subject-based learning activities to develop students' questioning skills at each level.

Evaluation

• Over 75% of students agreed or strongly agreed that the learning activities could develop their questioning skills.

1.2 To cultivate reading habit among students

Actions Taken

- 13 subject departments from different KLAs carried out various reading programmes for different levels.
- 12 reading sessions were arranged for S.1 students throughout the year. Parents and Student Reading Ambassadors were invited to participate in the activities.

Evaluation

- Students read regularly.
- The reading atmosphere during the reading sessions varied between classes. Students of two S1 classes performed well.
- 90% of Student Reading Ambassadors agreed that they had improved both questioning and communication skills through the reading sessions.
- All parents participated in the programme agreed that the reading sessions were beneficial to students and should be arranged next year.

1.3 To consolidate students' learning through various activities

Actions Taken

• Subject departments promoted and arranged outside-classroom subject-related activities.

Evaluation

- Over 70% of junior form students and over 80% of senior form students participated in at least one subject-related activity.
- Over 70% of students expressed that the subject-related activities were beneficial to them.

1.4 To arrange pull-out programmes for high achievers and the less able students

Actions Taken

- Early identification of high achievers.
- 13 subjects of different KLAs arranged pull-out programmes and enhancement programmes to cater for students' need.

Evaluation

• Over 80% of students found the pull-out programmes useful. Over 60% of students found the enhancement programmes useful.

1.5 To enhance learning effectiveness through peer tutoring

Actions Taken

- Students of the same class in S1 and S2 formed a total of 51 study groups. Group members met for peer learning.
- 31 peer tutors from higher forms attended the S1 and S2 study group meetings to assist the junior form students in learning.
- Senior form students of excellent academic results shared good study skills with junior form students.

Evaluation

- 66.7% of S1 and S2 students strongly agreed or agreed that they had learnt from their classmates in the study groups.
- Over 70% of the peer tutors expressed that they could help the junior form students in learning in the study groups. Over 65% of them enjoyed sharing their study skills with junior form students.
- S1 students reflected that they learnt a lot from the senior form students in the sharing session.

- Issue-based learning skills will be incorporated in the curriculum.
- A S1 inter-class book presentation competition will be held.
- An Inter-class Best Performance Award is to be presented to the class that performs well in the S1 reading sessions.

Major Concern 2: To foster among students positive values conducive to their whole person development

2.1 To broaden students' perspectives and heighten their social awareness

Actions Taken

- Students' and teachers' comments on current issues were displayed to foster students' community awareness.
- The 12th Singapore-Hong Kong Exchange Programme and a Seoul Trip were organized to widen students' horizons.
- A Leadership Training Camp, an Adventure Ship Training Programme, a series of S.4 elderly services, a S.5 Careers Talk and an Interview Workshop were organized.
- Students participated in a variety of OLE activities and workshops.

Evaluation

- About 70% of students reflected that their understanding of the current issues was enriched.
- Students shared their exchange experiences in morning assemblies, a photo exhibition and a self-published Seoul Trip booklet.
- 100% of the participants agreed that the training camps could enhance their teamwork, resilience to adversity and self-confidence.
- Over 90% of S.4 students agreed that the elderly services could help them to realize the situation of the weaker group of people in society and acquire better communication skills when serving the elderly.
- Over 80% of S.5 students agreed that the Careers Planning Talk could enhance their understanding of target setting and careers planning. Over 90% of S.5 students realized their strengths and weaknesses in interview performance from the Interview Workshop.

2.2 To foster students' positive values and attitudes

Actions Taken

- MEH lessons on promoting the importance of love, concern, self-discipline, respect for others, respect for life, responsibility, integrity, perseverance and commitment were held successfully.
- A series of diversified personal growth talks on topics of "Cyber Addiction", "Stress Management", "Media Education", "Sex Education" and "World of Poverty" were held.

• A S.1 & S.2 Peer Support Programme and Guidance Workshop, a S.1 to S.3 Adventure Training Day Camp were organized to nurture students' sense of co-operation, self-discipline and perseverance.

Evaluation

- Over 80% of the students participating in the personal growth talks agreed that the talks could help them to do self-reflection on their living style and heighten their social awareness.
- Over 87.5% of S.1 & S.3 students agreed that their willpower and relationship among peer students had been strengthened through the challenges encountered in the training day camps.

2.3 To foster a healthy campus

Actions Taken

- The school participated in the Healthy School Programme launched by the Narcotics Division and the EDB.
- An "Addictive Behavior" Talk for parents and a "Conflicts among Teachers and Students" Workshop for teaching staff were organized.
- A S.1 Fitness Assessment Programme, a Health Education Week and a Character Education Week for all students were held.

Evaluation

- About 80% students agreed that the Healthy School Programme helped them to fight against drug temptation.
- 100% of the parents attended agreed that the talk helped them to give advice to their children to get rid of drugs confidently.
- Over 90% of the teachers agreed that the workshop improved their mediation skills and understanding of the formation of conflicts.
- Students' awareness of the importance of being physically fit and caring about others was enhanced.

- To develop a whole person development framework through multi-disciplinary collaboration.
- To instill into students positive values and a sense of belonging to the community and the country.

Major Concern 3: To enhance teachers' professional development

3.1 To organize school-based staff development programs

Actions Taken

- Several talks and experience sharing sessions on topics of education for capacity-building of teachers were organized.
- Over five teachers were invited to share their expertise on selected pedagogies in regard to professional learning.

Evaluation

- 97.6% of teachers agreed that the school-based PD Program helped them to become more resourceful. With the highest rating of 10, 85.5% of teachers rated 8 or above for the three SD Days held.
- Most of the teachers appreciated that the Program not only provided them with a chance to share their ideas on improving school administration and teaching and learning, but also offered an opportunity for more interaction among colleagues to allow sharing of good practices and enhancement of peer relationship. Moreover, they pointed out that the recreation period did promote a sense of healthy living and helped maintain a good work-life balance.

3.2 To conduct collaborative lesson preparation, peer lesson observation and collaborative participation

Actions Taken

- All departments identified selected pedagogies for collaborative lesson preparation and worked out plans with the coordination of Heads of Departments.
- Collaborative lesson preparation and peer lesson observation were implemented in most of the departments.
- Time-tables were modified by the School SAMS Team to cater for teachers' lesson collaboration.

Evaluation

- All departments conducted collaborative lesson preparation and handed in at least one lesson plan focusing on questioning skills in the first term. Teachers agreed that the activity enhanced the effectiveness of teaching and learning.
- Some departments conducted peer lesson observation.
- Some departments held short meetings during the common free lessons and recorded the details on the handbook designed by the

3.3 To provide professional guidance and support for new teachers

Actions Taken

- Mentoring was carried out to support new teachers.
- New teachers demonstrated their teaching in October 2013 and department heads and the Principal were invited to give comments and suggestions. Peer lesson observation was also strongly encouraged to foster more positive and supportive collegial interaction.
- Induction meetings and experience sharing sessions of classroom management with new teachers were held.
- A staff handbook for new teachers was designed for use in 2014.

Evaluation

- All new teachers agreed that they received enough support to facilitate their teaching, handle student affairs, and carry out administrative duties.
- The new teachers made good suggestions for the new staff handbook.

3.4 To participate in continuous professional development activities

Actions Taken

- All teachers engaged in professional development courses, seminars, and conferences.
- Department-wise collegial sharing was conducted throughout the school year.

Evaluation

- All teachers attended various seminars and short courses. Some of them completed refresher courses like Special Education.
- No less than 8 departments or committees took part in collegial sharing in meetings.

- To devise new plans to improve teaching pedagogies through collaborative lesson preparation and better coordination with heads of departments and committees
- *To refine the staff handbook for new teachers.*



Reading to Learn

Objectives

- To instill the concept "reading to learn" to students
- To foster good reading habits to widen students' world knowledge and perspectives

Programmes implemented

- An online reading programme (www.welovehkteenagers.net) was organized by We Love Hong Kong Association Ltd. for junior students
- The Parent-Child Reading Programme, which aimed to enhance the relationship between students and their parents
- The Slogan Competition, which aimed to remind students of the importance of reading and to stimulate students' creativity
- The Free Newspaper / Magazine Reading Scheme, which aimed to encourage students to read more about current affairs

Evaluation

- Eight students had read more than 160 pieces of online materials this year, and were awarded certificates.
- All S1 students and their parents joined the programme. Eight outstanding book reports were selected, awarded and displayed in the foyer.
- All the junior students and nearly ninety senior students participated in the competition. The Champion, 1st Runner-up and 2nd Runner-up of the competition were selected from the junior and senior levels separately. The slogans of the Champions were displayed in the school in order to promote a reading culture.
- Free magazines and newspapers were put in the library and the foyer for students to take throughout the year.
- The activities were well-received with positive and encouraging feedback from students.

- To develop students' positive values and attitudes through reading
- To encourage students to share their life experiences

Project Learning

Objectives

- To facilitate students' independent learning capabilities
- To develop their generic and interpersonal skills

Programmes implemented

- S1 Joint-departmental Projects: doing projects on subjects relating to Personal, Social and Humanities Education
- S2 Cross-curricular Projects: doing themed projects on a variety of topics

Evaluation

- The performance of S1 students was satisfactory. Students were able to formulate questions, design mind maps and collect information independently. Students collaborated with group members and presented their findings in a systematical way. Good learning skills and habits were cultivated in the learning process.
- The quality of projects of S.2 was very high in general. Most students showed initiatives in doing the projects. Most of the students were able to collect relevant information, organize information systematically and analyze data and draw conclusions. The high achievers were able to include videos, plug-in animation and first-hand information like self-conducted interviews and surveys. Students showed creativity and teamwork in their work. The learning process was interactive and student-centred.

Evaluation

- With the Harmonious Campus Program and the Peer Support Program emphasizing self-discipline, S1 and S2 students were able to better adapt to the school environment. There were fewer misunderstandings and conflicts among them than before and they had better discipline and fewer misconduct records in the school year.
- With the Harmonious Campus Program, a Police Talk and the Zero Tolerance of Bullying Movement, students became aware of positive values and there was an overall improvement in students' conduct and no record of serious misbehaviour.
- Prefects, class teachers and discipline teachers patrolled in the morning assembly to remind students to be tidy in their appearance and uniform and as a result there were fewer misconduct records than before.
- The Recognizing Students' Commendable Behaviour Program succeeded in motivating students to pay more attention to their behaviour and improvement was shown.




